See that you do not refuse Him who speaks. For if they did not escape who refused Him who spoke on earth, much more shall we not escape if we turn away from Him who speaks from heaven, whose voice then shook the earth; but now He has promised, saying, "Yet once more I shake not only the earth but also heaven." Now this, "Yet once more," indicates the removal of those things that are being shaken, as of things that are made, that the things which cannot be shaken may remain.

Therefore, since we are receiving a kingdom which cannot be shaken, let us have grace, by which we may serve God acceptably with reverence and godly fear. For our, God is a consuming fire."

Now I refer to this scripture, not as a scare tactic but as a balm to our troubled minds. Jesus Christ is the mediator of the new covenant. His priestly and royal ministry on our behalf is a cause for celebration for the heavenly hosts, shouldn't we celebrate this too? The scripture states that we are the 'firstborn' because we share the inheritance of the Firstborn, Jesus Christ (Hebrews 1:6).

hand until I make your enemies a footstool for your feet" (Heb. 1:13). Thus, Jesus Christ has defeated the enemy (Hebrews 2:14-16) and been enthroned (Hebrews 1:5-14), but the enemies have not yet been destroyed (Hebrews 10:11-14, **Corinthians 15:23-25).**

But *God* will destroy these enemies in the future when God will shake the heavens and the earth. The shaking of the heavens and the earth means, then, the destruction of the earthly powers that persecute God's people and, more importantly, the destruction of the evil powers (Satan and his angels) who stand

> behind the earthly powers and control them.

> Now comes the really good part. There things, however, that will not and cannot be shaken, and they include the righteous. They will


shake "...yet once more ... not only the earth but also the heavens"

In the Old Testament, the shaking of the earth was a common metaphor for the presence of God, who shows up to deliver His people. (Judges 5:4-5; Judges 5:20; Psalms 68:7-8; Psalms 60:2) For Hebrews, the "shaking" of heaven and earth refers to the destruction of the enemies of God. This is what God promised at the enthronement of Jesus Christ. God said to Him: "Sit at my right not be shaken because they trust in God. He sustains us and guarantees our survival.

The created heavens and earth are fleeting, temporary, not permanent like God's eternal Kingdom. Permanence and stability are associated with Jesus Christ. Hebrews 1:10-12 says about Him: "You, Lord, laid the foundation of the earth in the beginning, and the heavens are the work of your hands; they will perish, but you remain; they will all wear out like a

garment, like a robe you will roll them up, like a garment they will be changed. But you are the same, and your years will have no end" (ESV). Hebrews also says that Jesus Christ's priesthood remains forever (Hebrews 7:3, 24) as does also the inheritance of the redeemed (Hebrews 10:34). In the final judgment, those who hold fast "in Jesus Christ" will not be shaken (Psalms 46:5).

Hebrews 12 also states that we will receive a kingdom that cannot be shaken. This Kingdom belongs to the Son but He will share it with us. So family, let us be grateful even in the face of hardships. Let us continue to do what is pleasing to Him. Let us worship Him by offering sacrifices of praise, confession, thanksgiving and good works, which is the true worship that delights Him.

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
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e hate the wilderness. It is an unproductive, dry, unyielding, and usually painful time in our lives. We want to go through a wilderness period as quickly as possible. In most instances, wildernesses usually extend unnecessarily in part, due to our actions or behaviour and most times because God wants us there so that we can learn one or two things before we go to the next level in our lives.

Let us take the Children of Israel on their way to the Promised Land for example. A few days' journey turned into 40 years. Yes, you heard me, 40 years of pain and suffering. Why the Lord would want people to take a long time travelling such a short distance, you may ask. The Lord needed that time to work on the children of Israel's unbelief rebelliousness. In my personal life, I have had some traumatic wilderness experiences, both as an individual and as a collective with my family. experiences have left me emotionally and psychologically scarred. However, the lessons I take from these experiences are that they leave me vulnerable and less dependent on my human capabilities. Instead, I realize that I need *Elohim* the great and mighty *God* more every day.

To be honest, I never really understood the wilderness concept. Every time I went through adverse conditions, I automatically pulled out my arsenal of prayer points and went into spiritual warfare. Every time something negative happened, I was quick to fire warfare prayer points and fight tooth and nail against the enemy. This was the only way I knew how. I did not know that sometimes challenges were sent my way to grow me from a baby who drinks milk to an adult who eats meat and bones solid food Hebrews 5:13. Can you imagine the children of Israel rebuking the devil in the desert because of the challenges they faced? Sometimes *God* takes us through some of these challenges/difficulties for our good so that we can grow, expand and become better people. Also, to fit into his plans and purposes.

For our benefit, I would like us to look at a young man in the Bible. Joseph, who we are all familiar with from *Genesis* 37-50, was a favourite son. He had the gift of dreams. were serious business in the Middle East cultures as they still are in today's modern society.

Joseph was a spoilt brat, daddy's favourite and was a tattle tell. He was bossy to his big brothers and arrogant knowing that he was a special child who had a bright future according to his dreams. His brothers connive to kill him but one of them suggests that it is better to sell him to traders instead.

Joseph is subsequently sold into slavery and here starts problems or rather his wilderness. (Kindly read the full story in the Bible) He goes from a favoured child to a slave. This must have been a very traumatic experience for young Joseph. One day you are free to go about your business without any cause for worry, then the next you are a slave belonging to someone else.

However, the Lord has Joseph in his favour. He soon rises to become a head slave in Potiphar's house. But with this favour comes a whole new set of problems. Potiphar's wife has her Jezebel eyes on the young man. When he turns down her

advances, she accuses him of trying to violate her. Joseph is soon cast into prison for something he did not do. His situation goes from bad to worse.

While in prison, he finds favour with the prison keeper, but that is cold comfort since it makes very little difference to his position. He is a slave who is in prison Not only that, but we also rejoice in our sufferings, because we know that suffering produces perseverance.

despite being in charge of the prisoners and running the prison affairs. At the end of the day, he is confined to a single location. He cannot drive down to the mall, read a book or have a cup of tea whenever he wants to. Prisoners' lives are strictly regimented. Where, how much and what time you eat, sleep, and whom you talk to are all decided by the overlords of the prison. What I am trying to say is that Joseph was restricted, he could only do a certain thing at certain times.

A chance to get out of prison presents itself when he interprets the kings' prisoners' dreams but two years pass before the chief butler remembers Joseph. He is in this wilderness for 13 years, a long time given the circumstances. Does he still have dreams of being a great man? Has *God* forsaken him? Does he think about his own family?

These 13 years shape and mould Joseph from being a spoilt and petulant young man to a man who is dependent fully on *God*. The painful years made him a man who could be trusted with a country and the affairs of the region. The arrogance

and pride he held before soon vanished. When he is presented to Pharaoh after a hard and gruelling 13 years on the back side of the world we see a mature and wise young man who credits everything to *God*, *Genesis* 42:16.

What happens next seems to play out like a movie. Joseph sat next to Pharaoh as the



second in command of the land of Egypt. These days Egypt is a superpower like China and the USA today. Can you stop to consider Joseph when he was younger in Canaan? His arrogance? The way he treated his brothers? Do you think that arrogant young man would have made a good ruler? That young man could have probably refused to help other nations that needed grain and food.

God saw it fit that Joseph should go through a metamorphosis. The young man who entered the house of Potiphar was different from the young man who stood before Pharaoh. Joseph had gone through

dramatic changes. He was changed from the proud and arrogant young man who was so full of himself to a wellrounded character who harboured

anointed King. Saul to me seems to be an idyllic young man. He is described as shy and when he is called up to take his place or his position of being King he is nowhere to be found instead he is found hiding. I imagine Saul as someone who had an easy life without any pressure compared to David or even some Kings in history. In fact, we are not told much about young Saul's life before the donkey incident.

no malice. He gave all the glory to the Allmighty when he interpreted Pharaoh's dreams. He elevated the *Lord God* and put all his trust in the Lord.

Now let us fast forward to another young man. Years later in the time of Samuel the great Prophet we see yet another young man. In 1 Samuel 9 – we meet Saul, tall and shy who is sent to look for his father's donkeys. Whilst searching

and here we notice a stark difference between Joseph and Saul. One was coached on the barren grounds of a foreign land going through adversity, slavery and imprisonment until he was transformed. The other (Saul) had one leg in and one leg out. We never hear of any challenges Saul faced. We never hear of what he faced in his life apart from the problems he created for himself through his bad decisions and bad choices.

Please dear reader do not misconstrue what I am saying, some people are lucky or rather blessed they go through life free of challenges like our dear King Saul of old. Whilst some people attract challenges and persecutions like moths to a flame. From my end, I think Saul was immature. Look at the way he handled his affairs. When he was told to do something, he did the opposite. He was worried about what people said about him. Instead of worrying about what God would do? Do you remember when he decided to take on the priestly role and sacrificed instead of waiting for Samuel? We see Saul making one bad decision after another. From my perspective, I think Saul was a bad King who lacked clout. He suffered from a bad case of inferiority complex and imposter syndrome. Had he experienced a bit of the wilderness he would have never made some of the decisions he made he would have learnt to wait on God.

Are you currently going through a wilderness? Do you feel forgotten? Are your prayers hitting a ceiling and not getting to *God?* Are you stagnant? Is nothing happening in your neck of the world? Let me implore you to listen to Apostle James "Count it all joy, my brothers, when you meet trials of various kinds, for you know that the testing of your faith produces steadfastness." James 1:2. Joseph was tested for 13 hard years where he suffered, he was mistreated and taken advantage of. He thought he was forgotten and had resigned himself to a life in prison. At that moment *God* rose and showed up

in all his glory. Joseph was elevated from being a lowly and dirty prisoner, he was washed, shaved and arraigned before a King and immediately given a position that was created specifically for him as there was no one in the land qualified for it other than himself. "Not only that, but we also rejoice in our sufferings, because we know that suffering produces perseverance." Romans 5:3. Perseverance was something King Saul did not have. 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


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When an encounter changes more than just a young man's heart and mind...

We were on the fifth floor while the floor below us was occupied by some residents who converted their apartments into brothels and party spots. Even the people we shared the apartment with were of questionable character. I will admit that I had an air of superiority when I compared myself to my sisters in *Christ* who partook in the oldest profession. They were overnight women of easy virtue, companions, prostitutes, and I was not. I never made a single friend, did not evangelise at all and receded to staying indoors at all times. Despite all the tests God gave me to humble myself, I would always feel and think that I was better than all of those ladies. 3 years later, God blessed us and we left that place moving to suburbia. It was like Heaven for me and I greatly appreciated it, life was good again. I made a concerted effort to scrub my memory clean of those days and assimilate back into my familiar suburban life.

As one of my hobbies, I make an effort to look for movies or stories with Christian content or lessons, especially for my kids. I make it a point that they watch that instead of the usual cartoon drivel on TV. One day I found the story of HOSEA. I watched it with my kids and they asked as many questions as possible. I found myself feeling quite irritated by the people of Israel. In my head, I kept asking myself why these ancient people would keep disrespecting *God* like that. I

mean really! I even went on to read the book of HOSEA and I felt more resentment towards them. As children of God, how can we prostitute ourselves to other spirits? We can never do such unbecoming things, right? WAIT what did the scripture say "...they consult a wooden idol and are answered by a stick of wood. A spirit of prostitution leads them astray they are unfaithful to their GOD" - Hosea 4:12. I took a minute to evaluate the meaning of Prostitution in God's eyes. I began to reflect.

This has given rise to the conception of WANANO where my passion lies. This is a platform where my husband and I teach the foundational biblical principles of marriage. WANANO started as a WhatsApp group with a few individuals and we saw the need to extend it to family and friends.









How do you balance your personal life, work and ministry? How do you detox, relax and unwind?

It is not easy at all to balance everything yet it is all doable. Once the mind conceives it, naturally it creates the capacity to achieve the set goals. I attend to everything according to priorities. My relationship with *God*, my marriage and my family always come first, because if I fail to minister to them with my time and deeds then I do not qualify to minister to anyone else. I can delegate other things except for my *God*, my husband and my children; I am very active in their daily routine.


do it. Time and chance happen to us all and your time will surely come.

actually adding value to them ourselves?

While asking myself these questions, I thought of the foremost example of this concept from the bible. To provide some context, God made similar promises to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, and they all had the same faith. Jacob was no stranger to clashes, and he was driven by a desire to obtain what he wanted for himself. Unlike his grandfather Abraham, Jacob used his cunning and deception to gain an advantage. Abraham's work was inseparably linked to his sense of purpose, which stemmed from his relationship with *God*. To some extent, Jacob was ignorant of this. His first notable act of self-serving behaviour was when he tricked a hungry Esau into selling him his birth right (Genesis 25:29-34). His second was when, with the help of his mother Rebekah, he deceived his blind father into

giving him the blessing meant for his brother Esau (Genesis 27:1–30.) True, it was always God's intention for Jacob to succeed Isaac, but he chose to take matters into his own hands and rise the ranks by relying on his wits. This is an example of getting the proper result while employing the

wrong methods. The animosity caused within the family due to these "wrong means" led Jacob to flee to his mother's brother, Laban. This is where the other power of association is fully realised.

Jacob toiled for 20 exasperating years on Laban's farm, during which time he amassed his fortune. Even though Laban had broken many of his promises to him, Jacob was successful in marrying Leah and Rachel further than his vast wealth. Jacob wanted to go home, but Laban persuaded him to stay and work for him, promising

him the ability to "...name his wages..." (Genesis 30 Vs 28). Clearly, Jacob had been a hard worker and Laban had reaped the benefits of his association with Jacob. So apart from the skulduggery that occurred between them, they both benefited from their two decades together. Jacob mastered the art of livestock breeding in addition to the shelter and protection he received from living under Laban's roof. Due to Jacob's blessing and skill as a worker, Laban's stock and wealth were greatly enlarged. The relationship was mutually beneficial.

Apart from the adverse health and economic impact, COVID-19 introduced us to a whole new vocabulary. Now we know of things such as Flattening the curve, Essential needs, Quarantine, Asymptomatic, Isolation and Social

> Distancing. The latter for the longest time robbed us of our usual gatherings and meetings. Even after the lockdown restrictions were relaxed, meetings are now taken online with apps such as Zoom, Skype, Microsoft Teams and Google becoming the norm. We are now in the era of "self", looking out for you and yours. When normalcy returned, well the version of normalcy that emerged from the ashes, we were then able to get together again with our acquaintances once again. But even today, instead of asking how much value



your associations provide to you, very few ask themselves the potent question, "How much value do I add?". Do you add ambience and life to your surroundings or are you there to selfishly leach the light out of them for self-enrichment?

Though motivational speaker Jim Rohn's quote "You are the average of the five people you spend the most time with." may be true it does not fully appreciate the gravity of association from a spiritual point of view. God's covenantal blessings are gifts to be received, not grabbed. They bear the responsibility of ensuring that they are used for the benefit of others rather than being hoarded. Like Jacob who wrestled the mysterious man in whom he "...saw God face to face..." (Gen. 32:24, 30), let us wrestle for God's blessing in faith and be transformed by grace, not for ourselves but for the enrichment of those around us. I take nothing away from the argument that there

is a great deal of wealth in the "Right" associations. However as much as they upgrade and develop us, the relationship must be symbiotic.

I pose a challenge to you now dear reader, to take it a step further. Next time you find yourself in a room where you are the smartest person, do not leave to find another one. Seek ways to add value and upgrade the room before you leave it. Instead of leaning on our wit and understanding, let us rely on *God's* wisdom to upgrade one and all. Not that I'm saying you must suffer mediocrity and negativity in that endeavour, but a positive attitude and teachable spirit are vital for both sides of the equation.

Feeling imprisoned by her own body, Charity Moyo lights a fire within and takes back her life and liberty. Taqa reached out to her to get some insight into the highs, lows and aweinspiring trials of her journey back to fitness.

hank you so much for your time Charity. Please give our readers an introduction to who you are.

My full name is Charity Moyo. I am a 40-year-old married mother of 3 beautiful children. I describe myself as a warm, loving, self-motivated and driven individual.

Tell us a bit about how you occupy yourself professionally.

Apart from being a wife and a mother, I am employed in the Gold sector, primarily in the Development Finance sector wherein I work with small-scale miners in particular women. My husband and I also have a mining operation specialising in base metals such as manganese, chrome, tin and copper.

We have followed your journey in fitness and your transformation is nothing less than phenomenal. Can you give us some insight on how the journey was? What were some of the highs and lows?

My journey started on the 3rd of February 2021 with my fitness trainer. At that time, I lacked self-motivation and zeal, but I had to lose weight not only for myself but for my family as well. I was 104 kgs then. I could barely walk 500 metres without feeling aches and pains in my joints, ankles and so on. I then realised that for my journey to be a success, I needed help. Often as



women, we think that asking for help is a show of weakness. I got in touch with a trainer on the 31st of January 2021 and he told me he was available to start training me on the 3rd of February 2021. My sessions would start at 5 in the morning and it was very hard, especially the first week. Every part of my body was painful and most times I would cry because of it.

A very close friend of mine called me and said "Charity you were made in the image of **God** meaning there are 3 of you in 1 i.e. Mind, Soul & Body. The body was crying in pain. The mind was telling me to give up because this pain was unnecessary and besides I hadn't even lost any weight in the 7 days that had passed. The Soul was yelling,



'You can do it Charity, this pain won't last forever, this is hard for your body because you last exercised back when you were in school over 2 decades ago.' So she was telling me to listen to the 'Inner Man' and to ignore what the body and the mind were saying'. My trainer had told me that if I continued training until the 10th of February 2021 I would have passed the test. I woke up in the morning on the 10th and the pain had disappeared. We continued training and I was advised to

stay away from the scale. The trainer would come Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays only. Meanwhile Tuesdays, Thursdays, Saturdays and Sundays I would walk for 5km. We continued in that fashion until the 22^{nd} of June when he decided to wean me off. At that time, I

was now 85kg and it appeared I had stopped losing weight. I stopped training for almost months and then resumed in August when I started buying small equipment at home like dumbbells, step run, barbells, weights, and skipping rope. On my own, I managed to slim down further to 75kg and have successfully maintained it.

Proverbs 11 vs 25 basically talks about the concept of Paying it Forward."

So, after your enriching experience, is there anyone

you are training at the moment?

Well I am not training anyone at the moment as am not certified, but I am a mentor. I encourage fellow women who are battling weight challenges that it can be done. With a great deal of commitment, anyone can shed excess weight and lead a healthy life. The fashionable phrase these days in business and personal circles is "Achieving a work/life balance". How do you juggle your personal life, work and fitness routine?

I take my fitness routine as a normal chore like making your bed, washing dishes and so on. The minute you consider it as something else it becomes difficult. At work I run up the stairs, I try to be as active as possible when I am at work. Now I can play fetch with my dogs. In terms of the actual exercise, it's three times a week. I allow my family, dogs included, to sit and watch. And trust me they enjoy doing it, even taking videos and complimenting me and so on.

Tell us how do you detox, relax & unwind?

Taking a walk early Sunday morning is a breath of fresh air. I get to relax, I get to listen.

Film: The Book of Eli

Denzel Washington is one of the most celebrated actors in Hollywood. He's good-looking, has truckloads of charisma and has had a well-storied career. So recently I decided to have a marathon of all my favourite Denzel vehicles which included, *Malcolm X* (1992), *Out of Time* (2003), *Courage Under Fire* (1996), *Ricochet* (1991) and one that I found a greater appreciation for on the second watch, *The Book of Eli*. In fact, I enjoyed it so much that I decided to review it for this month's issue. Released in 2010, *The Book of Eli* was written by Gary Whitta and directed by the duo of Albert and Allen Hughes known together professionally as the Hughes brothers. The twin brothers are recognised for previously helming violent films such as *Menace II Society* (1993), *Dead Presidents* (1995), and *From Hell* (2001).



In this post-apocalyptic thriller, Denzel Washington plays Eli, a man who believes he has been called to transport the final copy of a book across the country. In the vein of previous dystopian movies such as the *Mad Max* Series (1979-1985) and The Road (2009), we are introduced to a world ravaged by a vaguely described war, where food, shelter, and clean drinking water are all precious luxuries. This is the post-apocalyptic world that the protagonist has trekked his way through over the past 30 years, fighting off bloodthirsty gangs that rule the roads of this lawless civilization. Eli is a Godly man, who is guided by his faith and call to protect and preserve the only copy of the Bible that survived the war. As he journeys across the desolate wasteland that is now the western United States, Carnegie (Gary Oldman), the power-hungry despot who rules over a makeshift town, apprehends him. Carnegie wishes to seize the last copy of the **Bible** to misuse God's Word and gain ideological control over this war-torn society. Eli and Solara (Mila Kunis), a young woman from the town, protect the Bible from Carnegie, as they attempt to transport it into the hands of people who will respect and revere this sacred text, which holds the key to saving humanity.

"The Book of Eli" has an incredible Biblical message, which tells the story of Eli's unwavering faith as he honours God with his life and follows God's will no matter how hard the journey may be. We see Eli's faith remain steadfast as he faces many trials and tribulations, including gangs of bloodthirsty criminals, the power-hungry Carnegie, and a lack of basic necessities, such as fresh water, food, and decent shelter. Solara was born



into this post-war civilization and is unaware of the *Bible* or *Christ's* teachings. *Solara* can't read so *Eli* guides and instructs her in prayer. *Solara* asks *Eli* about life before the war and he describes how wasteful people were, tossing things away that people now would fight to save. He also explains to her that his devotion to carrying out *God's* plan has kept him strong and that he walks by faith.

One of the strongest messages I got from "The Book of Eli" was a warning to individuals and societies who desire to get rid of Christian principles from our current culture. A 2017 report released by the Pew Research Institute based in the USA found that government restrictions on religion have increased markedly in many places around the world, not just in authoritarian countries, but also in many democracies.

According to the report, "...over the decade from 2007 to 2017, government restrictions on religion (laws, policies and actions by state officials that restrict religious beliefs and practices) increased markedly around the world. And social hostilities involving religion – including violence and harassment by private



individuals, organizations or groups – also have risen since 2007. The study covered 52 governments that imposed either "high" or "very high" levels of restrictions on religion, up from 40 in 2007. And the number of countries where people are experiencing the highest levels of social hostilities involving religion has risen from 39 to 56 over the course of the study." Though I have to admit, the current levels of government limits on religious activities are a far cry from the perversity and anarchy that prevails in Eli's ungodly environment, I can't help but see a disturbing trend in the research.

If you are a sensitive viewer, the graphic violence in the film may be disturbing to you. Though it may not be much of a consolation, Eli only uses violence as a tool for self-defence. I found this movie to be action-packed, moving, and thought-provoking and if you can get past the violence and occasional profanity you will find an intimate study of a man whose steadfast faith leads him to relentlessly swim upstream against a tide of Godlessness. As a final note though I have to add I did notice the movie's not-so-subtle dig at how religion can be used to enslave rather than free. *Carnegie* wanted the bible for himself so he could corrupt the masses and use them to his own ends. Though the main theme of the film is that of faith, this revelation had me reflecting on just how much religion has been misused to subjugate minds over the ages.



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Recipes

1 tablespoon Chopped cilantro or parsley

1 lemon Cut into wedges

INSTRUCTIONS

- In a large bowl, mix the yogurt, lemon juice, garlic, ginger, kosher salt, black pepper, paprika, garam masala, turmeric, cumin, and cayenne pepper.
- Using a sharp knife, cut three slashes in each drumstick. Add the drumsticks to the bowl and rub the spiced yoghurt onto them.
 Marinate for 1 hour in the fridge
- Preheat your oven to 245 degrees C. Line a rimmed baking sheet with foil for easy clean-up, fit it with a roasting rack and spray the rack with non-stick spray.


BISCUIT BASE

- Grease and line a 20cm x 30cm slice tin.


